My Dear Parishioners,

What is about us humans? We do not like being told what to do. If someone says to us, "You can't," that is when we are tempted to say, "Oh yea, just you watch me!" Whether it is a troublesome two year old just learning to say "No", a boisterous teenager challenging their parent's assigned curfew upon them, or an impatient road-rage driver ignoring the speed limit, it does not matter. **Rebellion** which usually translates into **pride** or **arrogance** seems to be part of our human make up.

Today's readings for this First Sunday of Lent tell the story of **Salvation History**. Our readings are about **choices** that have dramatically impacted the human race. **Choices** usually fall into two main categories: **obedience/acceptance** or **disobedience/rebellion**. These **free** options/ **choices** for humans have been around from the beginning of Creation. These options/**choices** were presented to Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden. These options/**choices** were presented to Jesus in the desert and in the Garden of Gethsemane. These options/**choices** are presented to each of us on a daily basis.

Today's first reading comes from the Book of Genesis. This book of beginnings sets the stage for the rest of the Bible. God's gracious benevolence is apparent in so many ways. It includes creating man and woman so **free** that they can choose to be ungrateful to the Lord and even **rebel** against Him.

Today's Genesis passage comes in two parts. The first part tells how God's actions created and generated humankind from the earth. God in making humankind (Adam) made something very special. Clay from the ground becomes a living being when the breath of God enters him. Adam then is placed in a garden among whose fruit trees was "the tree of life" (a symbol of immortality) and the tree of "the knowledge of good and evil" (a symbol of God's right decision to determine what is good and what is evil.) God warns Adam not to eat the fruit from the tree of knowledge since this tree represented moral autonomy. The **temptation** for humans to "be like God" leads to the sin of pride; reliance on self rather than on God. But God has created Adam and his

partner Eve with **free will** enabling them to make their own **choices**.

The second part of today's reading presents the mythic drama of "original sin". Adam and Eve make a choice to disobey God and rebel against Him. As long as Adam and Eve cherish and obey God's word they know happiness and thrive. However when they turn away from God they render themselves to a host of ills. Once they eat the fruit from the tree of knowledge they are no longer comfortable before God. Their eyes testify to this new knowledge and lost innocence: ashamed of themselves and being afraid of God. They realize they are naked and seek to hide parts of themselves from each other and the whole of themselves from God. Cover-up becomes the new way of relating to God and each other. Adam will try and distance himself from Eve by placing the blame on her. The reality is that both Adam and Eve were jointly responsible for the "original sin" which tainted humankind.

St. Paul in today's section of his letter to the Romans reveals who the **hope** is for humankind: Jesus Christ. Paul reminds us: "as sin entered the world through one man's **disobedience** and through sin came death so salvation and new life enters the world through one man's (Jesus) **obedience**. The death brought about by original sin is both biological and spiritual (being the separation of people from God.) As Adam was at the root of all sin and death Jesus, the "New Adam", is at the root of all pardon and life. Jesus' righteousness outweighs all that Adam and Eve had done and gives humankind a new lease on life.

Today's Gospel deals with Jesus' temptations. Temptations are essentially internal struggles. Jesus' experience (though it came from an external source-Satan) was really His internal challenge and struggle. To convey the temptations Jesus experienced Matthew's Gospel simply dramatizes them and turns them into a dialogue between Jesus and the devil in the desert. Matthew was writing predominately for a Jewish audience so he patterns the temptations of Jesus after the

temptations the ancient Israelites experienced during the Exodus. They were tempted in the desert as they wandered amid hardships for 40 years while Jesus was tempted in the desert after 40 days of fasting and prayer. Matthew wants to show that whereas the Israelites failed their desert trial, Jesus did not. Whereas the Israelites did not embrace God's word, Jesus does as He makes fidelity to God's word the mark of His mission. Jesus feeds on and lives by the word of God. Obedience to that word will take Him through trial and temptation to the cross itself: the great sign of our salvation.

The theme of Jesus' central tests/temptations is basically the same as for Adam and Eve: obedience to God. Jesus' first temptation ("command these stones become loaves of bread") is a temptation to lose confidence in God's providence for providing ordinary material needs. It is a temptation for Jesus to distrust divine providence by taking power into His own hands. Though hungry after a forty-day fast Jesus never complains and refuses to use His miraculous powers for His own gratification and comfort. Jesus will not test the patience of God for His own convenience. He quotes Deuteronomy 8:3: "Not by bread alone does man live but by every word that comes from the mouth of God." Bread in the Old Testament was a symbol for God's revelation and word. Jesus is mindful, despite His own physical hunger that hunger for an understanding of God's intention and will is more important than the quest for food. Unlike the ancient Israelites Jesus successfully seeks God's will and not His own comfort.

That **temptation** that Jesus **distrust** divine providence by taking power into His own hands doesn't work so it is followed by another: to **presume** God's providence ("throw yourself down from this parapet of the temple"). Jesus refuses to throw Himself down from the parapet and refuses to take God for granted or **presume** on God's goodness. He is willing to submit to the ordinary course of events and He places His faith in God's plan. Cooperating with God's way of doing things Jesus steadfastly refuses to perform signs or wondrous spectacles to have others put faith in Him for the wrong reasons. Jesus quotes Deuteronomy 6:16: "You shall not put the Lord, your God, to the test."

Jesus' response to Satan is simply that no one should demand miracles of God as evidence of God's care for them. What Israel did frequently in the desert, Jesus will not do at all.

The third **temptation** for Jesus is to **compromise**. This **temptation** is the most subtle of all three **temptations**. Delivered when Jesus is lonely, weak, and friendless, Satan tries to play upon the human craving for power, fame, and wealth. Satan says to Jesus: "All these I shall give to you, if you will prostrate yourself and worship me." Jesus meets Satan's audacity with sternness: "The Lord your God shall you worship and Him alone shall you serve." Jesus will not bow down to Satan nor will He **compromise** His own ideals or goals or the standards that God sets for Him. Unlike the Israelites, Jesus always puts the Father and the Father's ways first and foremost.

The temptations of Adam and Eve were the exaltation of self. The temptations of Israel were to abandon God. The temptations of Jesus were to abuse His identity and mission. Unlike Adam, Eve and Israel Jesus used His freedom to choose the good. Temptations assail all of us in ways known best to each one of us. All of our temptations are based on various ways of sinning against the great commandment to love God with all our heart, mind, and soul and to love our neighbor as we love ourselves. Jesus has already shown us how we must overcome our root temptations: through engaging in prayer, doing penance, and giving extra attention to the Word of God. During our Lenten journey we will have an opportunity to undertake these practices. We are free to choose to accept this opportunity to do something or we can choose to rebel against this opportunity and do nothing. What will I choose? What will you choose? Have a blessed and holy Lenten journey.

#### THREE PILLARS OF LENT

**PRAYER** turns us away from sin's rebellion and draws us into right relation with our Creator. The summit of Catholic prayer is the Mass, and a good Lenten practice is to attend daily Mass if possible. The Rosary, Scriptural reflection, Eucharistic Adoration and other forms of prayer also help us get the most out of Lent.

**FASTING** is a discipline designed to remove whatever threatens to become more important than God in our lives. Normally, fasting focuses on food, but it could also involve other activities like watching television or playing video games. According to Church regulations, those in good health are to observe the following practices during Lent unless for some serious reason they are unable to do so:

**Fast** – Catholics from age 18-59 are to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. On a fast day, one limits oneself to one full meal and two smaller meals, with no snacking between meals.

**Abstinence** – Catholics of age 14 and older are to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and all the Fridays of Lent.

**ALMSGIVING** reestablishes the community dimension in our lives, reminding us that we are not here just for ourselves but are bonded in solidarity with others. Because of that solidarity, we have an obligation to one another, especially those in the greatest need. Participating in the disciplines of Lent is itself a sign of spiritual solidarity with other members of the Church.
