My Dear Parishioners,

Herbert Hoover served as President of the United States from 1929 until 1933 and was in office during the Great Depression. His encouragement of big business led to a handful of companies (including Standard Oil) controlling a large proportion of the country's wealth. The Wall Street crash in October 1929 indicated the failure of this policy and the subsequent depression revealed Hoover's lack of political and financial foresight. He believed the setback was only temporary and he declared at the height of the collapse that: "the fundamental business of the country is on a sound and prosperous basis." Not surprisingly, he was decisively beaten in the next Presidential Election. Years later, speaking with the voice of experience, Hoover stated: "Wisdom consists not so much in knowing what to do in the ultimate as in knowing what to do next."

The word **wisdom** has many different meanings. It means going beyond mere knowledge to the depth and breadth of the mind-boggling fullness of life. It means understanding and insight. It means the best way for one to relate to God and to other people. It means seeing every thought, word and deed in relation to values of our life. It also means to be watchful; looking for the Lord. This concept is portrayed in our Scripture readings for today. The Lord comes to us in many forms and ways and we can easily miss Him if we are not watchful. Part of being watchful is seeking God in our daily life.

Today's first reading comes from the Book of Wisdom which was written by an unknown author about a hundred years before the birth of Christ. With elegant wording and finely crafted verses, the Book of Wisdom urges readers to seek the Lord above all else. The Book of Wisdom seems to have had its origin among Jews living outside of Israel. Their language was Greek and they lived surrounded by Greek philosophy, heritage and traditions. Yet the Book of Wisdom gives the Jews plenty of incentive to remain faithful to their faith in Yahweh, their culture and their traditions. The author of Wisdom holds that Jewish traditions are far superior to any wisdom the Hellenistic world might have to offer the Jewish people. The author promotes all the advantages enjoyed by those who serve Yahweh; chief among them-the promise of immortality. For the author true wisdom comes with a sincere commitment to Yahweh. Wisdom is "unfading" because its light comes from Yahweh.

In today's passage the author of Wisdom exhorts his audience to seek **wisdom** (that gift which holds life for the just but condemnation for the unjust). In verses 12-16, the author offers a description of **wisdom**. He personifies **wisdom** as an alluring mysterious woman who is never far from those who look for her. Lady Wisdom is near, she lingers at people's gates and doors, she waits to be consulted on all manner of things, she walks the streets looking for those who are worthy of her. She is portrayed not as a rare and elusive being but rather as a

resource within everyone's reach. Like common sense, she is a gift which humans actively seek out. Those who actively seek her will readily find her. However, she is invisible to those who do not expect to find her at the heart of experience.

When it comes to **wisdom**, many of us shy away from the subject in the belief that **wisdom** is solely the proper concern of philosophers or poets. But if **wisdom** about "knows what to do next;" it clearly concerns all of us. The possession of **wisdom** results in parents and families who take their vocation seriously, leaders who look to the needs of their people, and persons who take into consideration all the dimensions of life, including death. The parable of the ten bridesmaids and their oil lamps as portrayed in today's Gospel confirms this view.

Today's Gospel story of the wise and foolish virgins is part of the eschatological discourse that makes up Matthew's Gospel (Mt. 24-25). It contains some allegorical elements but they are limited. The focus of these chapters is on the Second Coming of the Son of Man (Jesus) and the apparent delay of that event taking place. Matthew reminds his audience that this delay should **not** be met with diminished enthusiasm and lack of preparation. Matthew reminds all that one must be ready at **all times** because one knows neither the day nor the hour.

Matthew speaks about five bridesmaids who are accounted "foolish" because they were not prepared for what happened next. In this story the bride awaits the arrival of the groom at her own home. Her friends (the ten bridesmaids) are to meet the groom when he comes with his friends. They then join in escorting the couple back to the groom's house where the wedding-feast will be celebrated. But as it happens there is a hitch-the groom is late. All ten bridesmaids have lamps but only the "wise" five have a reserve supply of oil. The "foolish" five have no reserve of oil and they are unprepared for any delay. At midnight the couple arrived for the wedding celebration. The "wise" bridesmaids were present but the "foolish" ones were absent as they had gone back home to get more oil for their lamps. The 'wise" bridesmaids were invited into the feast while the door was shut for the "foolish" ones because they were not ready when it mattered. They were negligent and unprepared. The wisdom of the five "wise" bridesmaids consisted in doing what was expected of them in being prepared for the arrival of the groom. Their wisdom wasn't extraordinary but eminently practical. In the language of Herbert Hoover's maxim: "their wisdom consisted not so much in knowing what to do in the ultimate as in knowing what to do next."

The message of today's readings is rather simple: if we do what we have to do conscientiously, we have no reason to fear or be afraid of the unexpected; even death. As St. Paul reminds the Thessalonians in our second reading, we need not grieve over Christians who have died or worry about our own death because we all enjoy the benefit of Jesus' Resurrection.

There is a great blessing in doing the ordinary with sensitivity, in doing the same and sensible thing, in acting with common sense and with prudence.

Let us all remember the immortal and profound words of the fourteenth century mystic Meister Eckhart:" **Wisdom** consists in doing the next thing you have to do, doing it with your whole heart, and finding delight in doing it."

### KOFCOPENHOUSE






