Destination Imagination Team Places in State Competition

The OMPH School Elementary DI Team, led by Mrs. Natasha Drum, won first place in the PA State Destination Imagination contest and has been invited to go to the DI Global Finals! The team competed against 6 other teams in a structure challenge called Drop Zone. They had to build a structure using any wood of their choice with a 2" hole in the center. The structure had to be at least 7.5" tall, but not more than 9" tall, and weigh no more than 175 grams. The students also had to incorporate a sudden event into a skit with special props that they created. During the skit, the team had to stop and test their structure by having a team member drop 5 or 10 pound weights onto that structure.
